Annual Meeting to Feature "Border-to-Border" Trail Adventurers

The Arizona Trail Association will hold its 8th Annual Meeting and Luncheon on Saturday, February 2, 2002, 10:00 a.m. - 1:45 p.m. The event will be held at the Valley Field Riding and Polo Club located at 2530 N. 64th Street in Scottsdale. The spirit of the Old West adds a lot of charm to this very special and spacious original adobe-style meeting facility, which is situated in the Papago Buttes area surrounded by large verandas and 10 acres of Sonoran desert.

All ATA members, their guests, and any interested individuals or organizations are invited to attend the meetings and luncheon. Program will feature brief highlights and enlightening comments from recent Arizona Trail adventurers who have completed the entire 790-mile distance of the trail, from the border of Mexico to the border of Utah. These trail explorers have some fascinating descriptions of their journeys to share, along with some humorous incidents that made their travels very memorable.

Members who attend will also have the opportunity learn about the progress made in building and maintaining the Arizona Trail during the year 2001. In addition, a special tribute is planned to recognize all of the volunteer trail stewards who have provided the leadership and planning for more than 35,000 hours of volunteer trail crew efforts

throughout the state over the past two years.

Ballots for electing new Board members have been sent to all current ATA members, along with invitations and RSVP forms for the Annual Meeting and Luncheon. A copy of the invitation is also included in this newsletter on page 10. The \$12.00 lunch must be pre-paid, and reservations can be made by mail, e-mail, fax, or telephone on or before January 30, 2002.

The meeting location area is very easily accessible from Interstate 10 via the 143 freeway, and Interstate 17 via the 202 freeway. A map and directions are included on page ten. The facility is approximately 2 miles north of the Phoenix Zoo and the Desert Botanical Garden, 1/2 mile north of McDowell Road. Helpful directional street signage will also be provided the day of the event.

Plan to attend the upcoming Annual Meeting for an extremely enjoyable mid-day get-together, along with the opportunity to meet and congratulate some of the scores of volunteers who serve our organization. Annual meetings help inspire us to continue our efforts to build and preserve the route of the Arizona Trail, and also renew our desire to discover more of our state's scenic and diverse backcountry landscapes.

Arizona State Parks Funds New Arizona Trailhead Signs

Extremely well-designed and distinctive trailhead signs are going out for bid to signage craftsmen in the next few weeks, according to Annie McVay, State Trails Coordinator for Arizona State Parks.

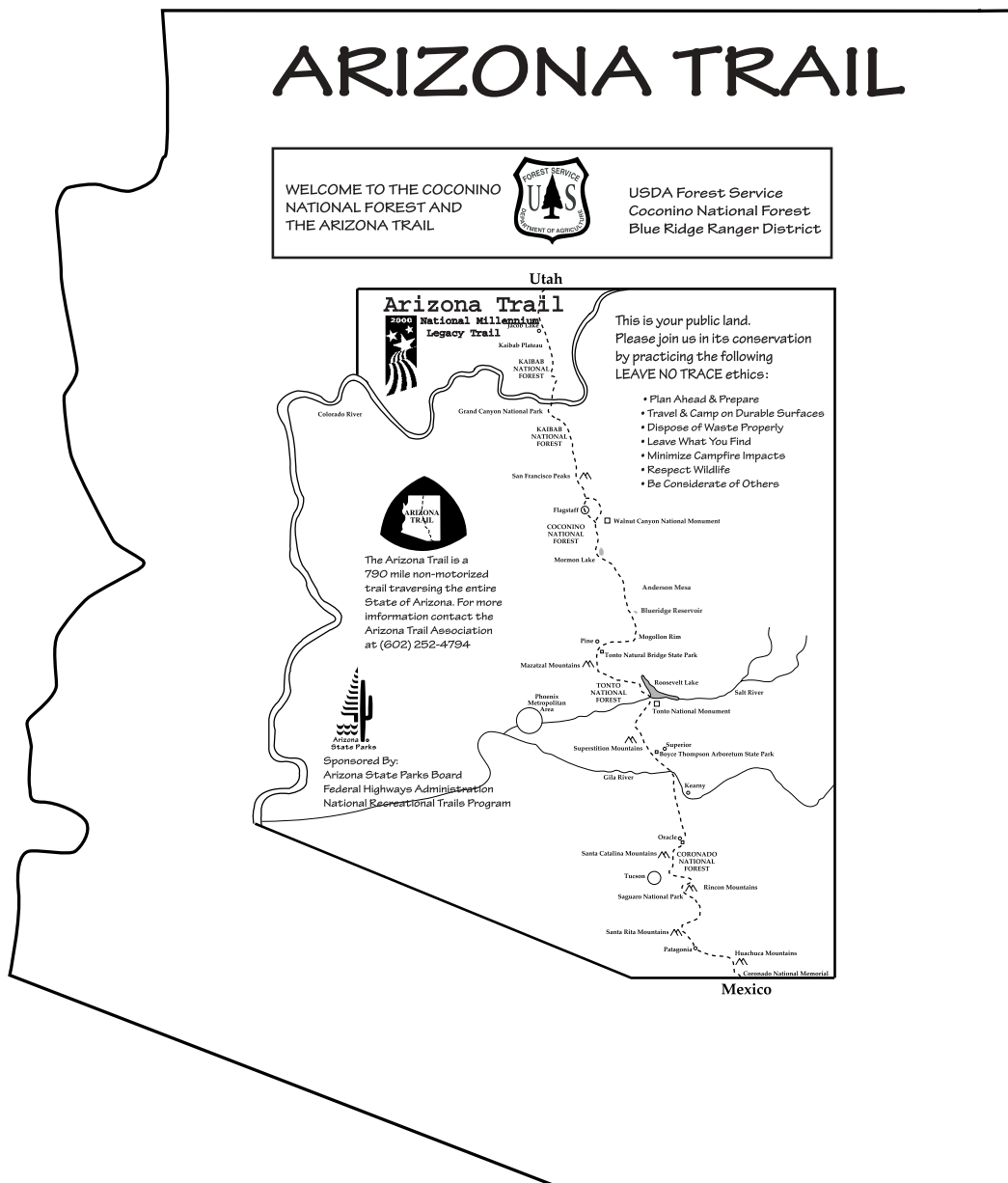
The signs will be placed at all major trailheads along the Arizona Trail statewide, with the land managing agency's name at the top of each sign, depicting the ATA's Agency Trail Partner in that geographic area. The standardized sign is very large, in weathered metal cut in the outline shape of the state of Arizona. The words "Arizona Trail" are laser cut through the metal so the scenic landscape background can be seen through the letters.

The signs were designed by Kim Vander Hoek, landscape architect for the Tonto National Forest, in the USDA Forest Service Supervisor's Office in Phoenix, with collaborative support from ATA's volunteer graphic artist, Phyllis Ralley, also of Phoenix. The signs will feature information about the Arizona Trail, "Leave No Trace" trail guidelines, the ATA's 2000

Millennium Legacy Trail designation information, a large map of the entire route of the Arizona Trail, and the names of the sign project funding partners, Arizona State Parks, Federal Highway Administration, and the National Recreational Trails Program.

When all of the trailhead signs have been crafted and installed, visitors to the Arizona Trail will see one consistent major signage system from border-to-border to help them become familiar with the statewide route. The signs will also provide information about the Arizona Trail Partners, the Arizona Trail Association, and some of the geographic highlights trail users will see as they explore an area along the Arizona Trail.

The Arizona Trail Association wishes to express its appreciation to Arizona State Parks for securing the funding for the trailhead signage project, and the Tonto National Forest for the design and management of the implementation plan for this significant Arizona Trail statewide signage program.



Regional Trail Stewards Hold Statewide Workshop

The route of the Arizona Trail is divided into six major geographic regions with a volunteer Regional Steward responsible for each section. The Regional Stewards facilitate the management of the planning, construction, and maintenance required along the 790-mile route of the Arizona Trail.



Eric Smith, the ATA Board's vice president of Trail Operations, convened an all-day workshop in Phoenix on Saturday, December 8, 2001, to review the year-end status of the Arizona Trail and chart the work on the trail that must be accomplished in 2002.

The Regional Stewards are Steve Saway and Steve Anderson in southern Arizona; Jim Martin and Eric Smith in central Arizona;

and Cynthia Lovely and Dawson Henderson in northern Arizona. All six volunteers have developed many years of trail planning and management skills. Many of the Arizona Trail Segment Stewards and expert trail crew leaders were also in attendance at the workshop.



The major issues and constraints were identified by region, and a plan of action was developed for each region. The action plan also revealed the large demand for volunteer resources, volunteer training, and trail tools in 2002, to fulfill the maintenance needs on more than 675 miles of the trail route that is now available for public use.

As a result of the workshop action plan, ATA's Chief Trail Steward, Larry Snead, immediately began working with the Regional and Segment Stewards to assist in scheduling more than 40 work events during the 2002 spring season, some of which are posted in this newsletter. Many additional trail work events and trail training workshops are added throughout the year and posted on the ATA website, in the ATA newsletters, in outdoor retail stores and public lands agency offices throughout the state.

John Neeling Accepts New Position

The ATA was saddened to lose John Neeling, our ATA Director of Trail Operations, near the end of 2001, however, we want to congratulate John on his new position with Recreation Solutions! In John's work with Recreation Solutions the ATA expects to be able to work very closely with John in his expanded statewide responsibilities with all trails in Arizona.

John could be involved in helping the ATA and land managers

throughout the state in the Recreational Trails Program funding that has just been awarded, which funds the improvement and maintenance of very large sections of the existing route of the Arizona Trail on federal lands.

All of John's fans in the ATA wish him the very best success in this exciting new position, and we look forward to partnering with him on many future Arizona Trail projects!

ATA Receives Financial Support from Arizona Horse Lovers Foundation and AT&T

Arizona Trail Construction Continues On Boulders Segment by Anna Pfender

As many of you know, the Mountain Bike Association of Arizona (MBAA) adopted a 9-mile segment of the Arizona Trail southeast of Florence two years ago. The MBAA segment is called the Boulders Segment and is on State Trust Land at an elevation of 3500-4000 feet. Currently a little over 3 miles of trail is built, so there is still a lot more land to cover. But so far the trail is terrific for mountain biking, hiking and horseback riding with mostly single-track, lots of rolling terrain, and enough twists and turns to make the trail interesting. The vegetation changes subtly as one traverses the trail from south to northwest beginning with plenty of cholla, prickly pear, hedgehog, and pin cushion cacti, along with palo verde, mesquite, and a generous helping of catclaw. After about 1½ miles, barrel cactus and yuccas are added to the mix. Further on as the trail climbs a bit, there are a lot of sagebrush encroaching on the trail. We'll see what the next 6 miles brings as we continue construction at future work events.

October 27th Work Event

MBAA segment steward Anna Pfender gathered five volunteers to do maintenance on the first 1/2 mile of trail. It has been two years since this portion of the trail was built, so the trail work consisted of redefining the tread and corridor to make the trail more visible. Our excellent crew made quick work of it and we finished in time to get home for game #1 of the World Series. Many thanks to crew members Merle Parmer, Cathy Schuyler, Doug Marsh, Jeff Pappas, and Tom Sondgeroth. The crew members were a combination of MBAA members and Arizona Trail Association volunteers.

November 17-18 Work Event

On this work event we constructed new trail on the 17th and did maintenance on the 18th. The crew on the 17th did a fine job of building about 1/2 mile of new trail. Crew members that day were Bill and Genevieve Garan, David Klein, John Dooley, Bill Florence, Chuck Horner and myself.

On the 18th David Klein, Doug Marsh, Mary Halfmann, Kevin Lockart, Chuck King, and Keene Johnson joined me. We did maintenance on the remaining 1 mile of trail that we didn't get to on the October 27th work event. Three of us also had the

opportunity that day to ride the trail on our mountain bikes, which turned out to be a lot of fun.

Look for more work events this winter as we continue construction on this beautiful trail. Hope to see you all soon on the Arizona Trail!

Wow, what a fall we had, with work events on November 3rd and December 8th. The weather really cooperated for us, as it was beautiful on both days. I am very excited with the progress we made these past two work events, as we constructed another mile of trail. ASCE YMF (American Society of Civil Engineers, Younger Member Forum) Phoenix Branch adopted this section of the Arizona Trail just over a year ago, and now have close to two miles completed on the 10 mile section. For those that aren't aware, ASCE YMF is composed of younger member civil engineers' throughout the valley, between ages of 20 and 35. We have a very fun and active group, with many of our members helping out each work event. As civil engineers, we feel comfortable around dirt, rocks and the like, but didn't necessarily take a class on trail building in college. Nonetheless, many of our members have really caught on to building trail. Two members in particular, Heath Therrien and Josh Sanders, have really taken to it. This fall, they approached me to take a more active role in helping out with each work event. They didn't wait long either, as Heath managed to recruit about seven new people during the big REI event. They have also started getting a small group to camp out the night before our event. The additional "hands" that they provided really made a difference at our last event.

I have to hand it to the volunteers who helped with the past four trail building events. We have accomplished quite a bit despite the increasingly rough terrain and a very big switchback that took most of one event to build. At times it was slow going and the tasks remaining ahead of us seemed to get bigger (rather than smaller) as we went along. It was awesome to see how this group really rose to the challenge of constructing this segment and I am very proud of what we have done so far. Each time we walk up that switchback I am reminded that spending that extra time there has really paid off.

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New Chief Trail Steward Announced

The Board of Directors announced the appointment of Larry Snead as the organization's Chief Trail Steward, a position that was identified in the 2001-2005 ATA Five Year Strategic Plan, but has gone unfilled until this recent appointment.

The position is part-time, under contract to assist in the management of ATA's trail stewardship program along with related key trail maintenance, training, and construction responsibilities. This new position became activated due to the absence of a full-time Director of Trail Operations, which was the position formerly held by John Neeling.

Larry Snead will be traveling the state to help manage the trail steward program with the objective of recruiting and training sufficient new stewards to cover the nearly 800 miles of the



Arizona Trail, border-to-border. He will also manage the Arizona Trail Partner Agency Relationship Program and will be communicating regularly with key agency contacts to maintain strong program coordination between the ATA volunteers and agency personnel.

A significant portion of the Chief Trail Steward's responsibilities is the development of a trail maintenance and signage program that will include a comprehensive trail condition status assessment and trail monitoring plan.

If volunteers are willing to conduct a trail maintenance or trail monitoring event, or are needing trail tools, trail construction and maintenance training, work event or steward information, or just want to find out where they can help the most, Larry is the man to call! ATA Receives Top National Trails Day Event Award!

How could we be so fortunate? A surprise telephone call was received, just before this newsletter went to press, from a representative of the DuPont Cordura corporation announcing our Arizona Trails Day event this past June, 2001, was awarded the American Hiking Society's top award for the entire nation!

The Arizona Trail Association was notified in the fall, 2001, that its application for the award was selected to be among the Top Ten nationally, and the final competition for the winner would be selected from this group. DuPont Cordura sent the 10 finalists a check for \$2,000, with letters of congratulations, and our Association was thrilled with this national honor.

ATA and many other organizations, communities, agencies, and individuals teamed together for the biggest National Trails Day event ever held in Arizona, with the 2001 statewide event theme "Community Trails: Pathways to Health." ATA and the other National Trails Day participating organizations joined



together in partnership with many of the state's health organizations to create awareness of the important link between good health and using trails as a way to increase healthy physical activity. The events were held in all corners of the state, including Kingman, Flagstaff, Pinetop-Lakeside, Phoenix, Superior, Safford, Tucson, Coronado

National Memorial, Yuma, and many more.

Then the "good news telephone call" arrived - out of the Top Ten, Arizona's National Trails Day event was judged to be the Best in the Nation! The honor brought an additional \$2,000 contribution, for a total of \$4,000 from the DuPont Cordura organization's sponsorship program. Thank you, American Hiking Society, and thank you, DuPont Cordura - we're thrilled with the honor and your outstanding support!

New Trail Stewards Announced

Bill Watson, segment steward for the Picketpost - Reavis Canyon passage for the past several years, has resigned his position. He has been very active in the ATA, using knowledge he gained from hiking the entire trail a few years ago to assist other hikers seeking information. Bill lives in Scottsdale.

Dear Fellow Arizonans,


I am writing to you today to share my enthusiasm for an exciting project taking place in our state called the Arizona Trail Project.

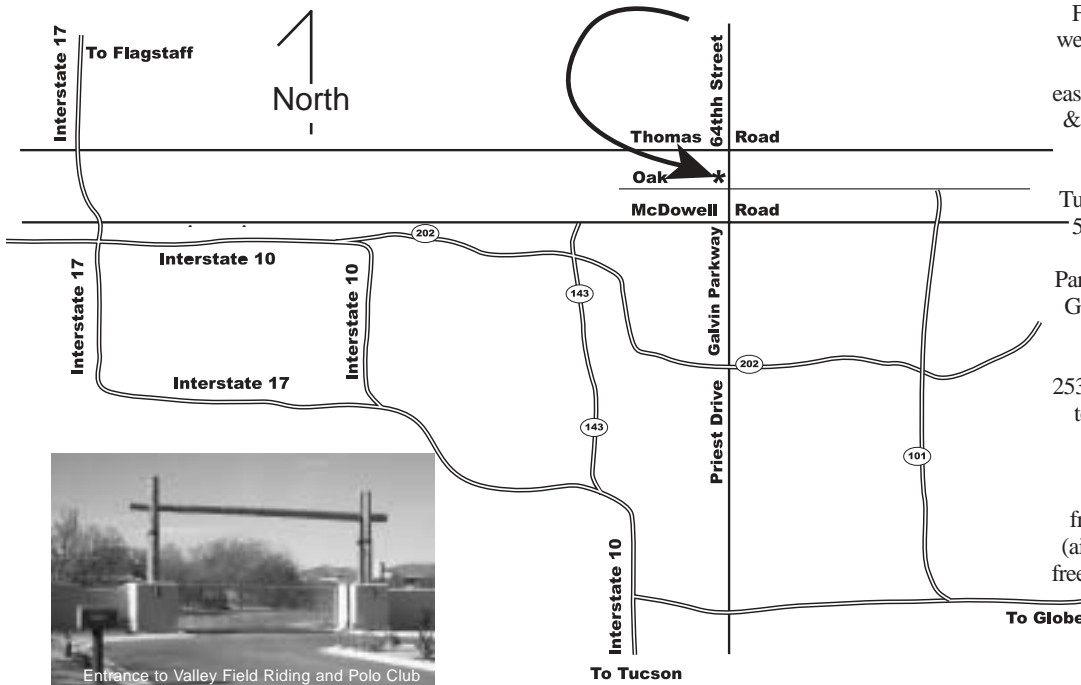
